### Where is God in Tragedy?

In recent weeks we have had some terrible tragedies. On Wednesday, March 26<sup>th</sup>, Firefighters Lt. Edward J. Walsh, age 43, Boston Engine Company 33 and Michael R. Kennedy, age 33, Boston Ladder Company 15, rushed into the basement of a burning building at 298 Beacon Street, Boston, MA, losing their lives in an effort to save the lives of others.

On Tuesday, April 1<sup>st</sup>, there was the Line of Duty Death of Plymouth Police Officer Gregg Maloney, who died when his motorcycle crashed.

On Wednesday, April 2<sup>nd</sup>, there was the tragedy of the shootings at Fort Hood Military Base, near Killeen, Texas in which four people were killed: Sgt. First Class Daniel M. Ferguson, Staff Sgt. Carlos A. Lazaney-Rodriguez and Sgt. Timothy W. Owens, along with the soldier who was accused of killing them and wounding 16 other soldiers before taking his own life, Specialist Ivan A. Lopez.

At some time in our lives we are all touched by some kind of tragedy. In these times it is not unusual for us to ask, "Where is God? Why would a good God allow such tragedies?"

As we prepare to gather for this coming Palm Sunday, we are aware of how Jesus was also the victim of a tragedy. Jesus didn't just die. He was executed by the authorities, by some of the very people who should have known better than to be threatened by someone who was going around healing people, forgiving people, and loving people. He was executed by people who realized their own sin in light of what Jesus was doing and they just

couldn't bring themselves to face their own hypocrisy. So, they executed the truth teller, Jesus.

So, where is God when we experience our own tragedies? Even Jesus cried out, while on the cross, "My God my God, why have you forsaken me?" But note: he still calls God "my God." Just as Jesus cried on the occasion of his friend, Lazarus' death, so, too, does God feel the pain of our own suffering and tragedies.

God does not manipulate our lives and the lives of others. God is with us when we gather for worship, for prayer, and for service. And, we believe, God is with us in our human suffering, betrayal, disappointment, and trouble. God has walked all of the tragedies that we face many times before.

It was not God's will that the Firefighters, Police officer, and the soldiers, remembered above, died. It was not God's will that their families were left without them. God is with us in every tragedy, in every darkness, in all of our pain and suffering. Even through the valley of the shadow of death, God is there, with us. God is dead set against all of the tragedies that take lives before their fulfillment.

As William Sloane Coffin said after his own son, Alex, died when his car plummeted into Boston Harbor, "God's heart was the first to break."

Following the ministry of Jesus, we see him in the places where people are hurting, forgotten, suffering, and pushed aside. We see Jesus where the least of these live and suffer. He brings truth, love, forgiveness, compassion, and healing. He does not leave us alone. It is in these places where I find the greatest compassion, the greatest empathy, and the greatest ties that bind us together in the love of God.

I live my faith by these powerful words spoken by God through the voice of the prophet Isaiah (41:10):

*"So do not fear, for I am with you;  
do not be dismayed, for I am your God.  
I will strengthen you and help you;  
I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."*

When I have been through tragic times in my life, God has been there, with me, through family, friends, and strangers. God has reassured me that lost loved ones and friends will continue to be in his care, and that he will continue to give to those of us left behind life, fulfillment, joy, hope, and lives worth living.

As we walk toward and through Palm Sunday, the Passion, the betrayal, arrest, trial and crucifixion of Jesus, let us remember how God was there then, to continue life beyond tragedy and death, how God has been with us in the past, and how God will, indeed, be with us now and in the future.

The love of God endures. It is stronger than our tragedies, and stronger than death. Where there is tragedy, there is God!
