Dear friends,

In the summertime, it's been Centre Church's practice to shout out hymn numbers as a way to pick hymns for the service. Those who were in worship on Sunday, August 14th were witness to something interesting.

When I asked for suggestions for our opening hymn, no one clamored to be first. In fact, there was silence. After making eye contact with just about everyone in worship, I suggested #3, off the top of my head, *remarking at how much I trusted God*.

What a surprise to see that #3 is "Wakantanka Taku Nitawa"! Not only can I not read music, but I also can't read Dakota (a Native American language). Had I spent more than a few seconds gazing at this challenge, I would have realized that right underneath the Dakota words, were the English lyrics (and, by the way, lyrics that were truly connected to the scripture and sermon topic!)

Had I spent a moment in reflection, I might have asked Doug to play it through once so that we could get the tune. Had I thought about it for any amount of time, I may have asked choir members to come to the front to lead us in the song.

Instead, I turned and asked for other suggestions. And, even as I thought I heard a collective sigh of relief, I wondered about my wisdom in asking for another song.

I mentioned that we could use this experience to show us that God may surprise us from time to time and that church should be a safe place to try new things. Even when we aren't prepared for whatever situation may arise, we can trust God.

The scripture on August 14th began with "Fear not". Maybe the lesson is that we shouldn't react so quickly. Maybe we should pray for help with our challenges. We spoke in church about being prepared. While I don't expect everyone to learn every song in the hymnal, it might be nice if, from time to time, we take chances and sing new songs on the spot as a way of preparing ourselves to be spontaneous.

Truth is, when I suggested #3, I thought it was "Joyful, Joyful". From out in the back, Jeff Law suggested we just turn the page and sing #4. Number 4 in the New Century Hymnal, it turns out, is "Joyful, Joyful". The biggest lesson I learned from this experience is that *even when we get it wrong, God makes it right.*

Mission Trip Ministry Moment

My friends and fellow congregants I have been asked to do a ministry moment for Mission Trips. The purpose of these trips is to bring relief to parts of the world where there is suffering and to show the world there is a God and he/she lives within each of us. It is also to show youth as well as young and old adults they are God's own hands and feet and a miracle right here on earth. It is also that they matter not only to family and friends but to a wider community.

These trips are funded in part by Missions right out of the collection plate through your designating a portion of your annual pledge to Mission and from various fundraisers. It is this faith community right here that has sent folks to H.O.M.E in Maine 3 times and to Tarboro, NC to work with Habitat for Humanity to rebuild houses after a flood there. We have worked in the SERRV Warehouse and also went to help lobby in Washington with the UCC justice ministries. There was a trip to New York City with Youth Services Opportunity Project run by the Quakers to provide workers in a variety of soup kitchens from the Bronx to the Bowery to Manhattan to Queens. We have taken 4 trips over 3 years with youth and young adults to New Orleans rebuilding after Hurricane Katrina. We sent a group to New Jersey after Hurricane Sandy and two trips to Joplin, MO to rebuild there after the devastating tornado that leveled that community. Last year we went to the Heifer Ranch in Arkansas.

We have never been alone in this effort; we have worked with UCC, Quakers, UUA, Disciples of Christ and the Mennonites. We have created bonds of friendship that transcend our small faith community and are helping create a world of service and caring that is so badly needed today.

Stewardship Ministry Moment

According to our bylaws, Stewardship Ministries shall inspire generosity of time and money in the service of Christ through this congregation. Stewardship is responsible for planning and implementing the annual Stewardship Campaign, overseeing the Planned Giving Program, and if requested by Parish Council, Supplemental Pledge Drives and other special campaigns like the Raise the Roof campaign that we had a couple of years ago. If we were to have a major capital campaign, Stewardship would provide oversight of that as well. In late winter/early spring, Stewardship launches our annual Stewardship Campaign. We usually use a theme from the UCC and order Stewardship materials through them. Letters and pledge cards are sent to members and friends of Centre Church to invite them to pledge. When the campaign is over, Stewardship sends reminder letters to people who usually pledge, but haven't yet submitted their pledge cards. We also send thank-you notes to everyone who pledges. Our Financial Secretary is the only one who knows how much people pledge, but he does provide Stewardship with the names of all who pledge so we can acknowledge receipt of their pledge and thank them for supporting Centre Church.

Stewardship tries to emphasize the importance of pledging. Parish Council needs to know how much income to expect during the fiscal year so they can develop an accurate budget and manage it effectively. Imagine if you knew you would receive a paycheck every month, but you had no idea what the amount would be. It would be impossible to make any kind of budget. The same holds true for the church. Pledging is important for us as individuals too. Our financial commitment demonstrates our dedication to the ministry of Centre Church. It says that we value the work of the church; that the church is important in our lives and in the lives we serve through our mission outreach. For those who like paying bills online, you can use the Online Giving link on the Centre Church website to pay down your pledge. What happens if your financial situation changes and you need to adjust vour pledge amount? Just contact our Financial Secretary, Jim Marshall. He will make the changes you request.

Just as it's important to be generous with our financial support, it's also important to be generous with our time. There are lots of volunteer opportunities at Centre Church. If you join a committee, help with Godly Play, or volunteer to work on an event, you are helping to further the mission of the church. In addition to helping the church, you will have fun and make friends! Working with others toward a common goal helps new folks and long-time members get to know each other and feel more invested in the life of the church.

If you would like to learn more about Stewardship or help with the annual Stewardship Drive, please let me know. We are always looking for fresh faces and new ideas. Sometimes people say they are reluctant to join Stewardship because they don't like asking people for money. I have two responses to that comment. First, there are behindthe-scenes ways to help Stewardship. Secondly, I prefer to think that Stewardship's job is not to ask people for money, but to remind them of what they already know – in order to grow and thrive, the church needs our support. - Debbie Cotting

Ministry Moment – Flower Committee

Oh, the joys of the Flower Committee. I am almost afraid to tell you how much enjoyment one can derive from this ministry. Just don't plan on an early Sunday lunch.

Here are the nuts and bolts of the Flower Committee. Members, in teams of 2, receive a schedule of Sundays when they will deliver flowers (usually about once every 5-6 weeks) to homebound or invalid folks. A card and Sunday bulletin are delivered with the flowers.

Sounds easy, right? Well it is! Now comes the fun part. When you show up at someone's door or room with flowers from the Church they just light up. Rarely do folks take the flowers and close the door. Often it leads to sometimes long conversations. They are just so thrilled that we, the Church, remember them and would take the time to come with flowers. This does not just go for those who are mentally aware. Many times we have visited an Alzheimer's unit to deliver flowers. I have had folks just squeeze my hand and beam when I tell them, usually a few times, we are from the Church. They seem to get it. Sometimes to the surprise of the care providers. Want more? Show up at Brooksby or Sunrise when the intended receiver is at lunch and it's really big. Having a couple of folks walk into a crowded room with flowers and deliver them, with a flourish of course, and tell these folks, with their friends around them, that the CCC stills loves them and misses them is really special.

Want more stories? Ask a Flower Committee member. I know I have some and I'm sure they do too.
