Worshipping at Home in a Pandemic

As I sit here at my kitchen counter drinking coffee in what is becoming a new routine, I feel like I have so much to share with you, and nothing at all. What I mean by that is, I feel so in need of connection and completely flooded with too much information. The constant stream of information that comes at us in "normal" times is too much. In this pandemic, it is a firehose. But instead of dousing the fire, all it is doing is fueling it. And I am learning that it is up to me to step out of its reach. I can't turn it off, but I can certainly take myself out of harm's way.

Just as I was hitting a real low in both mood and energy yesterday, I was reminded about the heart of all things and reminded that it is within my power, and yours, to tap into the heart of all that matters. In this holiest of weeks, I can't imagine anything more pressing to share with you. So here goes.

The first reminder came to me from author and activist Glennon Doyle in her new book, *Untamed*. As I read Glennon's account of her own liberation, I am reminded of my own. It is in the mutuality of our lived experience that I was reminded that I carry Knowing within me. Glennon discovered this when a friend sent her a card that said, "Be still and know." This simple and yet profound phrase led her to 10-minute daily sessions of sitting in silence. As she says, "If you just stop doing, you'll start knowing." I learned this in seminary when I took on the spiritual practice of centering prayer. I quickly discovered that when I got very still, I was able to connect with the deep knowing within me that I call God.

Glennon's description of what it feels like to sink beneath the chaos into the place where all is quiet and clear matches what I feel. And reading it last night reminded me that I haven't been still and known in a while. So, this morning I invited myself to return to my own stillness and knowing. And I am inviting you. In this particularly chaotic, noisy global crisis we are trying to live through, I can think of nothing more lifesaving than taking time to be still and know!

The second reminder came from an article by Stephanie Lape, a Lutheran (ELCA) pastor in California. She wrote an article for livinglutheran.org on 6 April titled, "My Take: Why are we doing this, anyway?" As religious educators at both the high school and college level, Lape and her husband, Eric, shared the pastime of critiquing every worship service they went to. Immediately after worship, they critiqued everything from the sermon to the coffee, the sense of mission to the friendliness of the people. They went on this way, Sunday after Sunday, until one particular Sunday when their two-year-old son said, "I want to go where the man is." Of course, "the man" was not a particular pastor or friendly congregant, the man he was referring to was Jesus. "I want to go where he is." He then described the church where he thought Jesus was, and when they arrived for worship, Lape shares, "That morning, for the first time in decades, I worshiped. I went there to be with 'the man."

Ultimately, we are not consumers of worship. We are makers of worship, we are worshippers. All of us! You and me, alike. Lape said beautifully what I want you all to know. "We worship leaders aren't trying to produce Hamilton; we're trying to

help people encounter Jesus Christ." And doing so in this time of social distancing, stay-at-home, remote worship means that more than ever, we are each responsible for connecting to our own Knowing, the heart of all things – the Spirit of God that is within us in the deep silence, and attending worship with the intention of encountering "the man," Jesus the Christ. All of us who are creating digital worship experiences are giving our all to offer you avenues for encountering Jesus, for authentic worship. None of it is perfect, because none of us is perfect. But it is offered out of our own deep love of God, our connection to the heart of all that is. It is an invitation. An opportunity to "go where He is."

On behalf of everyone who has and who will participate in creating our worship experiences, I invite you to see and hear with your heart and your own deep Knowing. Come to worship Him!
