Happy New Year, Centre Church!

Welcome to 2021! While these first days of January might not feel any different than 2020, I am hoping you'll accept an invitation to try something with me in this new year. It is as simple and as complicated as this: Commit to showing up for yourself, so that you can show up for others. While that will mean something different for each of us, I offer what it means to me as a jumping off point for your own reflection.

I recently heard author, researcher, and Socratic advisor Jim Collins answer this query from podcaster Tim Ferriss, "You have a billboard to get a message, a quote, a question, anything you like to billions of people. What might you put on that billboard? Doesn't have to be one thing, but what might you put on it?" And Jim's answer was, "How have you changed the lives of others?" ("The Tim Ferriss Show," tim.blog/podcast) He had just spent the better part of two hours sharing about his life and work and the mentors who have shaped him, invested in him, inspired him, so his answer in the form of a question was an apt summation, an ultimate question for the full arc of a life, if you will.

As I've turned that question over in my mind, I homed in on the most important lesson I learned in 2020: I am better able to show up for others when I first show up for myself. Oh, I have paid lip service to that lesson plenty, but I believe the last time I actually lived it was when I was a new mother, and then only in part. Yes, this is akin to the "first put on your own oxygen mask before you help others" metaphor but truly it goes much deeper in my experience. It is not just showing up for yourself in one way, but in every way. It is attending to your WHOLE self – mind, body, AND spirit. And each of those in their complexity. It is stopping to focus on your breath when you are stressed. It is savoring the

experience of eating a ripe and juicy orange and thanking God for it. It is cultivating your spiritual practice, showing up for yourself on your yoga mat, your prayer chair, your daily walk. It is tending to your sleep, removing the obstacles that keep you from getting quality rest. It is putting boundaries around your Sabbath. And it is tending to yourself with curiosity and wonder rather than harsh judgment, learning to love all that you are and forgiving all that you are not.

No, we are, none of us, good at tending to all and everything, every minute of every day. Yes, you could get lost in just looking after yourself and ignoring the world. But in a culture where we are only as good as what we produce, by ourselves, showing up for ourselves first is countercultural. When we are depleted, physically, spiritually, or mentally, we're not much use to someone else. But, when we tend to our whole selves with intention, we can show up with our whole selves for others. When we have tended our own needs for nourishment, our needs don't get in the way of our service. We, as Christians, have such a gentle AND fierce mentor in our brother Jesus. The stories of Jesus tending to his own very human needs are sprinkled all through the Gospels. Take a look and see what you find!

In this new year, I invite you to join me in showing up for yourself, so you can show up for others. Only you can decide what that means for you. The world is hurting, deeply. There is so much pain and brokenness that needs our help and healing. Let's offer the best of ourselves to that work.

Angel Tree gifts 2020 style

Thank you all for participating in our first ever drive-through drop-off of Angel Tree gifts for City Mission. Outreach Ministries teamed up with Tower Day School families to collect, sort and inventory donations. Together, we packed and labeled everything in bags and boxes so neatly and compactly, that the collection JUST fit exactly into every bit of space (but the driver's area) of a 2013 Hyundai Santa Fe. The count came out to 750 items and applying standard prices per item, close to \$8,000 of brand new clothes, toys, gifts and wrapping supplies which surely brought joy on Christmas for many families served by City Mission of Boston. These totals include 61 gift cards totaling \$1,180 to CVS, Old Navy, Target, TJMax, and Walmart. Thank you for being generous givers in 2020, as need has recently been greater than ever.

Shopping Card donation match

PASTOR PARISH RELATIONS COMMITTEE

There have been recent questions about the purpose of the Pastor Parish Relations Committee (PPRC). Please review the information below for the description of the committee.

WHAT IS A PASTOR PARISH RELATIONS COMMITTEE?

A *Pastor Parish Relations Committee* is a small group of church members who provide support for the pastor and offer a regular channel of communication between the pastor and the congregation.

WHY HAVE A PASTOR PARISH RELATIONS COMMITTEE?

There are two main reasons for a congregation to have a *Pastor Parish Relations Committee (PPRC)*:

1.) The first reason for a congregation to have a PPRC is to serve as an advisory group - sharing ideas, hopes, expectations, and concerns of the congregation with the Pastor. This committee will take the lead in seeking to improve communication and cultivating an open, affirmative and creative relationship between the pastor and congregation.

If needs arise, the PPRC will serve as mediators to assist with negotiation and resolution.

PPRC is a confidential committee that requires a high degree of trust among members, the pastor, and congregation. The committee will meet regularly and will provide an annual report to the congregation.

2.) The second reason to have a PPRC is to provide focused, consistent support for the pastor. The PPRC is a way in which a congregation is intentional about providing support for its pastor and family.

The PPRC helps interpret functions, roles, and the needs of the pastor to the congregation. The committee will be responsible for encouraging the pastor to plan time for recreation, relaxation, family need, and solitude. The Committee shall conduct a formal performance review of the pastor and be an advocate for personnel policy, continuing education, and sabbatical leave.
