House of God

Genesis 35:1-15 tells the story about how God spoke to Jacob, telling him to get up and go to another place and settle there. He is told to build an altar to God when he arrives at his new home. He is also told to get rid of excess jewelry, bury it, and stop worshiping foreign and fake gods.

As Jacob traveled through different countries on his way to his new home, God protected him and kept him safe. God told Jacob to name his new home Bethel, meaning "House of God."

So, this makes me wonder. What comes to mind when people think of you, of your home, of your church? Do people think of you as a person of God, your home a place where God is welcome, and your church as a place where the voice of God is welcomed and remembered?

I remember how, on the first day of my ministry at First Congregational Church, Billerica, I decided to visit one person. I was advised to visit Maudie and so, I did. I will never forget how I felt about her, and her very small, simple home. She was a woman of God. Her small, simple home, a house of God. And, the words and thoughts she shared with me, echoes of God. She did not need anything fancy to be a person of God, just a sincere heart and a mind that read the scriptures and reflected on them every day.

Every day of her 100 years on this earth were days with God.

Whenever I wanted to experience God's presence, I would visit Maudie.

Whenever I wanted to reconnect with my spirituality, I would visit Maudie.

Whenever I wanted to be lifted up, I would visit Maudie.

Look around your house, are there places in your house that are like altars to God?

Look in your heart. When people think about you do they feel your heart is filled with God?

Hospitality is one way to build a home where God is felt to live. Whenever we welcome people into our homes and make them feel comfortable, we are setting a place at the table for God. Making a home where our family always feels safe and secure is another way of making our homes a house of God.

God gave Jacob specific instructions about how to make his home a place where God is present. Are we going to do it God's way or our way? We, in

But, your heart can be a heart filled with God's love and thus, be a saving presence to those around you.

God called Jacob to be the person and place where God could be found. Perhaps God is calling you to also be that place. It would be nice. It would be a blessing. If not today, perhaps tomorrow. If not tomorrow, perhaps you will continue to ponder it and prepare a place for God to enter.

I pray today and every day, that our church will be such a place where people will turn when they are looking for God. I pray that when people are looking to find God's loving ways, they will know that in our place of worship and gathering they will find it. Perhaps it will not be such a place every day, but I pray it will be so most of the time.

May the Lord use me as one of the tools through which the house of God will be built. May the Lord use you to also be a builder of God's holy mountain, holy house, and holy home.

May we, together, be moved to be the house of God in our hearts, minds, souls, homes, churches, communities, words, thoughts, and actions.
